HUMANITARIAN ECOSYSTEM MAP GUIDANCE

INTRODUCING THE MAP

This ecosystem map is a high-level rapid snapshot of key entities that constitute the current Humanitarian Innovation Ecosystem as they relate to the innovation stages as laid out by the International Development Innovation Alliance (IDIA).

The map is a representation of the current ecosystem and is not a recommendation of what an ecosystem should be. The map is not exhaustive of all actors within the ecosystem, but takes the approach of identifying the key categories of entities and identifying some of the most prominent actors in each. The map and table only cover entities that are working across regions or globally.

The scope of the research did not cover national or local level entities..

It is recommended that further research is carried out at the country level to capture local humanitarian innovation ecosystems. The map does not attempt to show the relationships or interdependence between the different ecosystem players. It represents what role the actor plays in the different stages of the innovation journey or in supporting the wider humanitarian innovation ecosystem (either directly, or from an adjacent ecosystem).

This map has been developed through rapid desk research and checked with key stakeholders who have a deep understanding of the system. For better readability, we recommend printing this document or using the zoom feature in your PDF reader.

NAVIGATING THE VISUAL MAP

The visual map is sliced into horizontal and vertical sections:


- the funnel that is laid out horizontally across the middle of the diagram represents an innovation journey as defined by IDIA, around which the map is built
- the second, third, fourth and fifth horizontal sections represent the primary categories that directly support humanitarian innovations through the innovation journey
- the vertical sections represent the six distinct stages of the innovation journey and house the actors involved at each stage in each of the categories of support

Actors within the Funnel

Actors have been grouped under four primary categories:

- **Funders:** Those who provide the funding for or invest into humanitarian innovation initiatives
- **Fund Managers:** Those who manage and invest funds on behalf of 'back donors'. They often provide other forms of support to the innovators (directly, or through partners) and can provide wider support to the humanitarian ecosystem
- **Support Providers:** Those who provide innovation support through dedicated accelerator programmes/labs/incubators
- Brokers & Coordinators: Those who act as brokers and/or coordinating bodies and mechanisms helping make connections, disseminate learnings and expertise on humanitarian innovation

The primary categories are represented on the left, with each category running across a horizontal section through the different stages of the journey. Primary categories are then divided into sub-categories highlighted with a distinctly coloured shape. Within each sub-category, entities are then provided with identifying numbers. The colours for each primary and associated sub-categories, names and numbers associated with each entity can be found in the visual map. The detail for each actor, i.e. the primary role, definitions, sub-category, number, thumbnails and how they map against the stages can be found in the information table on the next page.



Ecosystem Strengthening and Adjacent Ecosystems

Above the funnel is the 'Adjacent Innovation Ecosystem' category with entities in adjacent ecosystems that have provided some support to humanitarian innovation, even though it is not their primary focus. These are mapped against the stages in the funnel.

Below the funnel is the 'Humanitarian Innovation Ecosystem Strengthening' category, showing entities that are specifically supporting the wider humanitarian innovation ecosystem. These are not mapped against the stages in the funnel, as they are focused on strengthening the wider system.

Stages of the innovation journey

Each innovation stage is demarcated by the vertical lines on the map.



HOW TO USE THE INFORMATION TABLE

The information table provides all the data that has been collected and used in the visual presentation. The structure of the information follows the categorisation as per the visual map.

Actors have been grouped under four primary categories - Funders, Fund Managers, Support Providers and Brokers & Coordinators. There are sub-categories that further disaggregate the types of actors. Under each sub-category, there is a representative list of entities that play a notable role or make a sizable contribution to humanitarian innovation. It is important to note that the list of entities is not exhaustive. For each entity we have provided a short description in the form of a thumbnail. There are two sections to the table. The first section covers entities that are primarily focused on humanitarian innovation, whilst the second section holds the entities that are in adjacent ecosystems, and where their primary focus is not humanitarian innovation.

As you move across the table, the next section represents the six stages of the innovation journey, with a short description for each stage. Here we use a simple check mark to indicate if the entity plays a role in the different stages that correspond with the visual diagram on the previous page.

CAVEATS

We recognise that numerous actors play multiple roles within the humanitarian innovation ecosystem. In this map, we have presented actors according to their primary focus and role across the stages of the innovation journey funnel. The only exception is the roles actors play in the space of 'Humanitarian Ecosystem Strengthening', as this sits outside the funnel.

We know that there are vibrant local innovation ecosystems in multiple countries and regions. For the purpose of this exercise, we have taken a global view whereby we have not included actors who have a very local or single-country focus. We have included actors who provide services regionally and/or internationally.

We have been intentional in including actors and initiatives that are currently running or still exist, as opposed to past and/or completed initiatives. Therefore, you will not see previous key contributors such as USAID and DFAT Australia.

The information in the table has been collected through desk research and data available in the public domain. In some cases, where the information is unclear, we have made assumptions based on our own knowledge and understanding of the work the entity carries out. We have included a 'Rationale' column to capture some of our assumptions and thinking. As the exercise was time-bound, we have been unable to verify the information individually with the actors included in the map.
